Canada At War

In 1885 British Colonies including Canada were offered a measure of self-government and became an independent dominion.

The Boers (Dutch Settlers) and British were at war 1889-1902 in South Africa. Canadian troops were sent to assist Britain.

In 1914 Russia invaded western Prussia, then Germany became involved. In 1916 the British and French launched the Somme offensive when thousands of lives were lost. The Verdun Bulge, a series of battles, was the greatest slaughter of human life in history. 1918 brought America to aid the British. Armistice was declared November 11, 1918.

Unrest in 1936 "The Spanish Civil War" involved USSR and Germany; the Comintern organized 53 foreign countries to fight facism. Later the "Civil War" was referred to as a dress rehearsal for the Second World War.

Canadian service men and women were involved in all the above battles however the mention of their participation is rare in any of the written accounts.

Canada began training troops and one such group, the 14th Canadian Light Horse with 144 men with mounts and living in tents were photographed by Gibson Photo Studio of Saskatoon in camp at Dundurn, SK 1938.

When King George VI and Queen Elizabeth visited Canada in 1939 some of the troops moved by train ahead of the royal train so that the same soldiers were guards at more that one stop. These soldiers were

referred to as Saturday night soldiers and were eventually moved to other units and were involved to the bitter end in 1945.

Emotional and physical scars were worn as a matter of fact, however medical and dental care was provided. The courage that came in the form of the daily cup of rum, with whiskey and beer when available was easily turned into a habit and became a problem for some.

Reader's Digest November 2001 published an article written by Tom Hanks (actor) while he did research for the movie "Saving Private Ryan" where he tells his own story about life's struggles, finally realizing his life was not so bad when he admitted he had never been asked to kill anybody and had never seen anybody get killed.

It is often said veterans did not want to talk about war or what they did. Food for thought!

The "Legion Magazine" prints articles and stories of the real way it was for veterans, some are still able to travel to visit the graves of their fallen comrades overseas.

A recent book, "A March to Fear" WWII by Jack Shepard is well named for the vivid story it tells of life in the trenches when a bath and shave came sometimes as often as once a month. Transition to civil life in peace and quiet required adjustment. Those who returned home from the killing fields believed the real heroes were those who were left where they fell in battle.

Canada at War: Participation and Casualties*

SOUTH AFRICA WAR (1899-1902)

Approximately 7,000 Canadians served; 267 of them gave their lives.

FIRST WORLD WAR (1914-1918)

Approximately 650,000 Canadians served, including members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, Canadians and Newfoundlanders who served with British forces (Newfoundland was a colony of Great Britain until 1949) and merchant mariners. Of this number, nearly 69,000 gave their lives.

SECOND WORLD WAR (1939-1945)

More than one million Canadians and Newfoundlanders served in Canada's Armed Forces, in Allied forces or in the merchant navy; over 47,000 of them gave their lives.

KOREAN WAR (1950-1953)

26,791 Canadians served in the Canadian Army Special Force; 516 of them gave their lives.

PEACEKEEPING

Nearly 125,000 Canadians have served in peacekeeping missions over the past 53 years; as of October 2001, 113 Canadians had given their lives in this service.

KOREAN WAR

- 16,327 their average age is 71.

George Akister was killed in battle in Sommes, France in 1916. This letter arrived after his death.

Somewhere in France
Sept 7th 1916.

Dear Gladys,

As I have a few minutes to spare I thought I would write you a few lines to let you know that I am in the land of the living but I nearly stoned to death a week ago I had the toothache very bad and went to the dentist but he could not pull it and my mouth was so sore I could hardly eat anything and as soon as it was a little better I went back and got two dentists and finally had it extracted. The weather is very changeable over here some times it is wet and cold and the next thing one knows it is hot as hell Well news is scarce over here I am not allowed to tell you what I am doing or where I am or if I like it or not but I am well at least and you may guess where I am I nearly wrote it at the beginning. I do not know when this war will be over

but I hope I do not have to put this winter in this God forsaken country.

You do not need to be anxious about me just do the same as I do and try to forget it. I find it is the best way. If I come walking in with one leg and minus a head before long do not be surprised. The girl wrote me a very good letter and told me she could not consider going back to Canada with me as she thinks I am not the young man she wants to spend the rest of her life with as I will have to go home alone much as I would like to have her for company. But who knows I may have something to say about me spending the rest of my life as a confirmed old bachelor. I think this is all for this time. Hoping you are all well and that I get a letter from you soon but unless we get mail often than we have done lately I will not get any and I also know that there is mail for me.

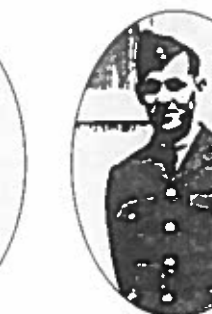

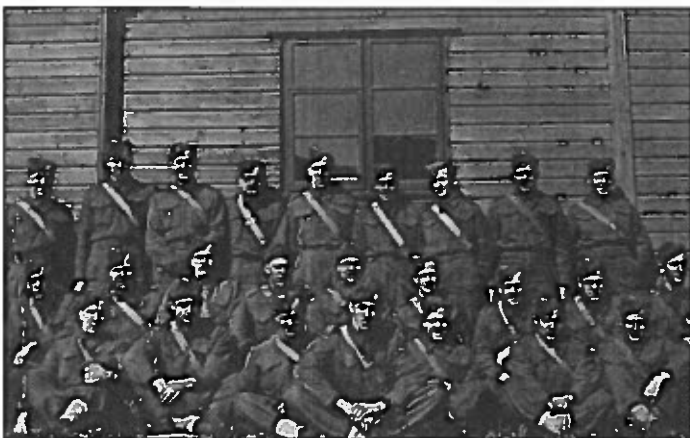

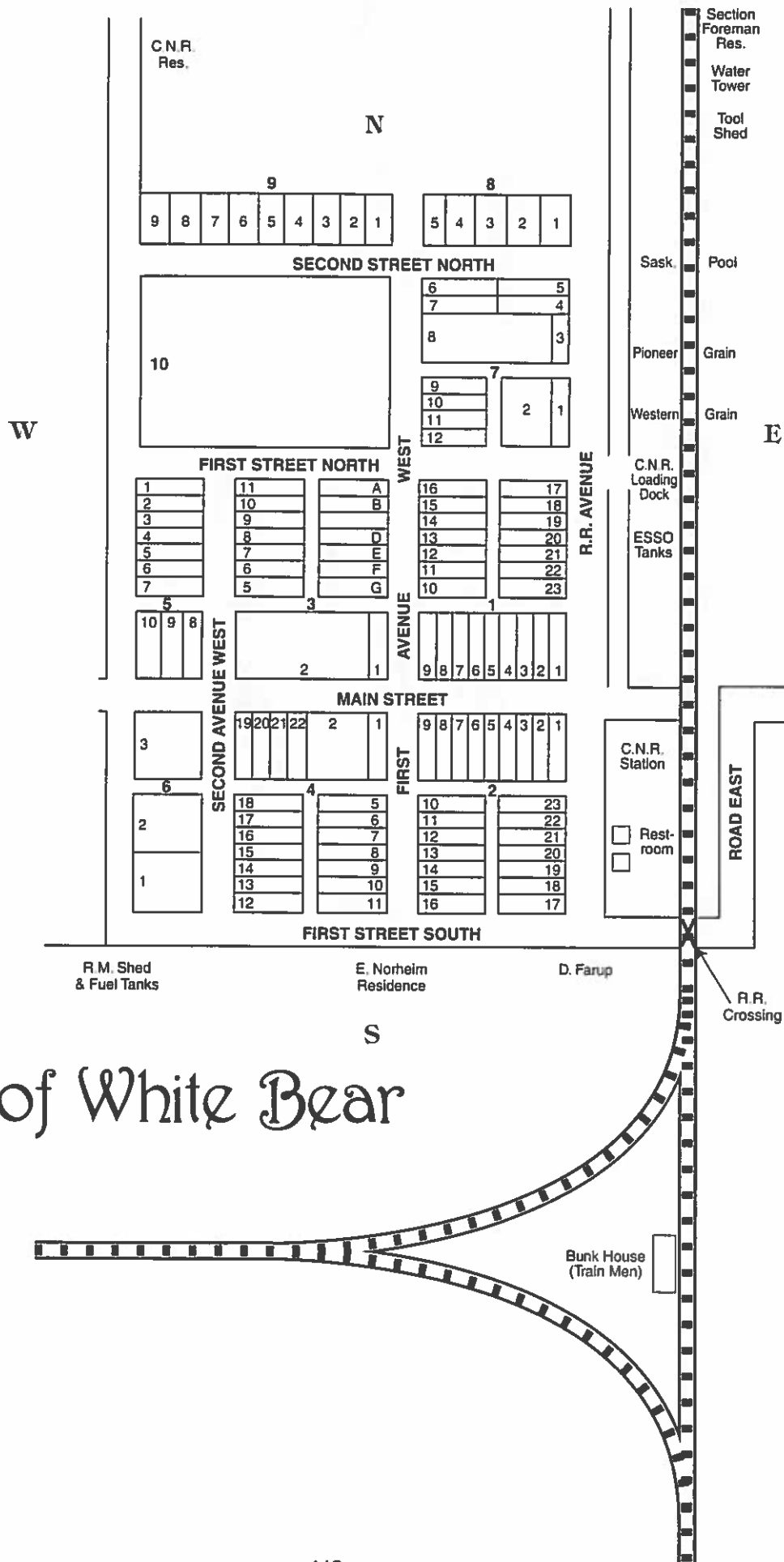

The Cemetery

The cemetery located two miles east of White Bear town site was known first as the Darrow cemetery.

Remus Darrow died in 1908 at twenty years of age, the first death in the settlement and he was buried on his homestead. It is presumed the site was donated to the community and became known as the White Bear cemetery.

This location was widely used by the neighboring communities like Tuberose, Kyle, Lacadena and Sanctuary in the early years of settlement until others were developed.

It should be remembered that travel was done with horses in winter even for those doing the undertaking job. In 1941 Andrew Stewart and Douglas Gibson travelled with team and sleigh from Tuberose when Mrs. Redmile passed away in her home in White Bear.

Over the years clean up days were organized and for some time were well attended with families doing the necessary repairs. Time and the elements have taken their toll on many grave covers and head stones.

In the 1960's Rev. Frerichs, the United Church minister having come from a large city in Ontario found the condition of country cemeteries appalling

and should be given credit for the R.M. of Lacadena hiring the grass cutting done in all locations.

The first plots at White Bear were purchased at three for \$5.00; ninety years later they are \$20.00 per plot.

I.H. (Bert) Akister was the first record and map keeper, he received \$10.00 per year. After his retirement Ivan Akister took over the record keeping and at the present time Maurice Akister has the job. I hope the remuneration has been raised somewhat.

Neighbours with pick and shovel dug graves, two men working together until another shift took over. Winter weather and frozen ground made this a very difficult task. Thanks to those who worked so hard before the backhoe was available.

On April 27, 2001 some fifty personnel with trucks, bobcats and shovels moved into the White Bear Cemetery, removed the broken covers, leveled the graves and straightened the head stones. "Satisfaction" was one comment; "A wonderful job" was another comment.

"Thanks" to all who organized and did the work and to those who go there every year to do work with out any recognition. You know who you are!

Machinery Dealer

Ivers and Calvert, Stan Sawyer followed by Elwell Clark were agents for Massey Harris from the early years until 1945 when Elwell moved to Kyle. Fred Handley managed until 1952 when the Fors Brothers and Bernard Monson became the new managers.

Fors Brothers overhauled motors of all kinds, mended, welded, repaired, made what couldn't be purchased and even entertained the fire side group as they worked during the winter. They were agents for J.I. Case, the Case emblem of the eagle perched on a globe of the world stood high above the door. When Fors left the business Bernard managed for a short time. When he moved to Swift Current Lennox Draper and Sons became Versatile farm machinery agents.

Many signs adorned the building over the years, besides the eagle and J.I. Case signs- "Farm Machinery" painted on the front, Radio Repair Shop as well as the original metal Massey sign attached to the front below the windows west of the door.

The building extended almost the length of the entire lot providing plenty of room for tractors etc. and history says it became the shelter for an otherwise rained out sports day.

It was dismantled and removed from town by Master brothers.

Cockshutt Dealer

Paul McKay opened the Cockshutt Implement Agency in the mid 40's He sold White Rose gas and oil products. Elma was a registered nurse and was called on many times to attend to the ill and injured. The business closed when they moved to Prince Albert. The shop became residence for the L. Schuler's, Nelson Graham purchased the house.

Rutherford

Maxwell Rutherford, among the early arrivals built a large hardware and grocery store across the street, directly east of the Driscolls store, probably as early as 1926 with comfortable living quarters attached at the south end. The Rutherfords closed the store in 1934, after that the store portion was used for community activities, families occupied the living quarters for several years and later the building was dismantled.

Teachers encouraged students to clip coupons from magazines and papers to order free samples. Companies for example, Jergens and Ponds and many others would send free samples by mail. A few weeks

later the school held a sale in the Rutherford store - it was well attended, the funds from the samples sold were used to purchase checker boards and crokinole boards. Many Friday afternoon tournaments were enjoyed during the winter. The sports equipment was very limited, we felt lucky to have a new softball and bat to start in the spring.
