WELCOME STUDENTS BACK TO SCHOOL-

Please remember to watch for all the excited school children on their way to school and on their way home. The speed limit for the school zone is 30 km/hour. Please slow down.

BACKYARD FIRE PITS

The Town of Kyle does not have a fire ban in place, but we do rely on property owner's good common sense. Bylaw #39 A Bylaw respecting fire prevention (3) *"No bonfire or other exposed fire for burning flammable waste material shall be kindled within 25 feet of any building except upon permit of the Fire Chief; and any such burning shall be done between sunrise and 8:00 pm, when a competent person shall be constantly in charge of the fire until it is extinguished. The burning shall be in a properly constructed brick or metallic burner covered with a suitable 1/8" wire mesh or an incinerator of a design approved by the Fire Chief."* **PLEASE respect your neighbours when having a back yard bonfire AND MAKE SURE IT IS EXTINGUISHED when you leave it.**

STREET REPAIRS AND DITCH GRADING

The culvert installs have been completed on 4th Ave as well as ditching on the south side of the street. Ditching for drainage has been completed on the 100 and 200 blocks of Centre Street and will continue for 1st, 2nd and 3rd Ave. The streets in the poorest condition have been graded to level them out. We are next looking at sand sealing, but this work will not be done until next season, after we have had a chance to see how the street surfaces are holding up through winter and how much crowning and packing need to be done.

Smoke Alarms at Home



SMOKE ALARMS ARE A KEY PART of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- Current alarms on the market employ different types of technology including multi-sensing, which could include smoke and carbon monoxide combined.
- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions, yet mitigate false alarms.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

FACTS

- ❗ A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- ❗ Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level. Smoke alarms should be connected so when one sounds, they all sound. Most homes do not have this level of protection.
- ❗ Roughly 3 out of 5 fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.
